SOURCE OF GOLD

The speaker at our meeting held April 24th was Tom Neel, of New London, OH, who spoke on a topic he has researched for many years: people who left North Central Ohio after the discovery of gold at Sutter's Mill in California on January 24, 1848 (36 days before Morrow County was established). Mr. Neel listed several sources for research:

> Letters and diaries Newspaper accounts Local histories (look for the name "California" mentioned) Traditions passed down (although these can become exaggerated) Court documents created during the 1850's, such as deeds, divorces, etc.

In the Morrow County Museum at Pleasant Grove is a recent picture of a tombstone located in a cemetery in Santa Clara, CA, donated by the photographer, Beverly Dimmick, of Mission Viejo, CA. It clearly shows the inscription of a memorial to a transplanted Buckeye:

> SOLON FLACK of Morrow Co., Ohio Died Dec. 27, 1856 aged 31 y'rs. 9 mo's. & 27 days.

RYE & INDIAN BREAD

2½ cups flour
3/4 cup cornmeal
1 pkg. yeast
1½ cups milk

tup molasses
tbsp. shortening
tsp. salt
cup rye flour

[makes two loaves]

In a large bowl combine $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups of the white flour, the cornmeal, & the yeast. In a saucepan heat the milk, molasses, shortening & salt just till warm (115 - 120) and the shortening is almost melted; stir constantly.

Add warm mix to flour mix. Beat on low speed 30 seconds. Beat 3 minutes on high speed. Using a spoon, stir in rye flour and remaining white flour. Cover and let rise in warm place until doubles in size (1 hour).

Stir down dough; divide in half. Place in 2 greased 1-qt. casseroles. Cover and let rise about 45 minutes. Bake in 350 oven for 25 to 30 minutes.

(A recipe for one of the foods served at our November 1987 "Mayflower Party" program. One of the features was to serve refreshments reminiscent of early-American life. Not necessarily authentic, but basic and simple foods in character with the times.)

THE MAYFLOWER --- Passenger List

Of the 102 passengers who set sail on 16 September 1620 (intending to settle in Virginia), 41 were classified as SAINTS: members of a Separatist group led by William Brewster. The rest were STRANGERS: artisans, soldiers and servants, mostly members of the Church of England, who were hired by sponsors of the voyage to settle in the new colony. Christopher Jones was the ship's captain; there were 25 crewmembers.

PRESBYTERIAN,

MOUNT GILEAD

An article in the January 20, 1909 issue of the <u>Union Register</u>, a weekly newspaper published in Mount Gilead, related the existence of the earliest records of the Presbyterian church in Mount Gilead. In the possession of P. J. Miller was a book described as "little, old, and badly worn", which contained accounts of the earliest years of the church. (The founding of this congregation predated by several years the change of name for the town, from its original, "Whetstone", to its present name, "Mount Gilead".)

"At a meeting held in Whetstone, November 2, 1831, the following persons having procured certificates of their dismission from other churches as communicants in good standing, were duly organized into a Church of Christ by the name of 'Morvin':
