### NOVEMBER PROGRAM


Mon. November 23; 7:30 p.m.: "BACK TO THE BOAT: THE STORY OF THE MAYFLOWER"

Special guest will be Mr. Richard Chase, of Marengo, Ohio, a descendant of Richard Warren and a member of the Columbus Colony of the Society of Mayflower Descendants.

### DOLORES RUTH GRAY ARNOLD

The first census of the United States, taken in 1790 lists the names of two men living in Pennsylvania, who knew nothing of each other, one, Andrew Wickizer, of Wilkes-Barre, who migrated to Fairfield County, Ohio in 1809, and whose gravestone to this day proudly and legibly states "Born in the Reign of King George the Third, in Montgomery County, New York".

The other, Michael Rice, Shown in West Nantmill Township, Chester County, who likewise migrated to Fairfield County in 1799, after he had served in the War of the Revolution as a wagonmaster, General's Department. (Note - his resting place is well marked in a private cemetery on land he had purchased and developed in Greenfield Township of Fairfield County).

To this day it is not known whether these men ever met, but Andrew's daughter, Lydia, and Michael's son Jacob did, and they were married in Fairfield County on May 4th, 1815, this being after Jacob had served with General Harrison during his campaign northward through this part of Ohio in the War of 1812.

About 1821, as the pioneers began to cross the Greenville Treaty line, Jacob, Lydia, and their three small children moved to what is now Canaan Township, of Morrow County, and purchased land alongthe Middle-Fork of the Whetstone River, here they built a cabin, cleared and tilled the land, and raised a large family. Jacob and Lydia are buried in the "Rice Cemetery" on a portion of that land. Here one of their sons - Simon, was born, and here he lived his entire life.

Meanwhile, a couple of miles east, John Campbell, a young lad arrived from Virginia with his widowed mother. On reaching maturity, John married a Miss Lucinda Downs, and their daughter met and married the above mentioned Simon Rice. To this union was born a daughter - Zelma Awilda Rice, and she in turn met and married another young man from Fairfield County, a Mr. George Middleton. To this marriage, my mother, Alta Fern Middleton was born. She in turn met and wed Harley Andrew Gray. Harley's father was Jeremiah (Charley) Gray, a native of York County, PA, and his mother, Ella Jane Doren, was born in Riga, Michigan, and for many years they were residents of Edison, Ohio.

Harley and Alta inherited the farm in Canaan Township which had been her parent's home. Here they raised a family of six children, of which I am the youngest daughter. My marriage to Winton Arnold, (A native of Wayne and Ashland counties, resulted in the birth of a daughter - Patricia - now deceased, and a son, Mark, unmarried, and a career officer in the United States Army.)

Patricia was a registered nurse, married Charles Martin, and became the mother of two sons, Scott, living in Atlanta Georgia, and he and his wife Cheryl are the parents of my Great grandson, Gregory Winton Martin. Her younger son Steven, unmarried, living and working in Hawaii.

As for myself, I am a homemaker and retired nurse, living in Canaan Township, on the farm where my parents and grand-parents lived. I am proud to be a member of the "First Families of Morrow County", "First Families of Marion County", "First Families of Fairfield County", "First Families of Ohio", a fifty year member of The Caledonia Memorial United Methodist Church, over forty-five years a member of Esther Temple #90 of the Pythian Sisters, a member and Past Matron of Vera Chapter #64 of the Eastern Star, and by virtue of being descended from Michael Rice, I am a "Daughter of the American Revolution".

It stretches the imagination as to how all the parts of this jig-saw puzzle fit together to make my family complete, but it does, and I am Dolores Ruth Gray Arnold.
