MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

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The Morrow County Genealogical Society is rendering a valuable service to our citizens in that we are preserving important records of the history of our first families. We are collecting and publishing gravestone inscriptions in old cemeteries that are fast deteriorating. We have republished an old County Atlas 1871 and maps that showed land ownership of 1857.

These materials are, and will be, of great help to other genealogists who find their roots in Morrow County.

Our group finds great pleasure in discovering and helping others find clues to their family origin.

Every member should try to be present at our meetings, when possible, and contribute facts they have uncovered in their research. Important items can be recorded in the minutes and thus preserved.

Some ways to help new or beginning genealogists should be, and often are discussed in our meetings, such as travel routes, church records, political trends, even criminal records that name participants.

THE CENSUS *** NOW & THEN

1990

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the population of Morrow County in 1990 was 27,749, an increase of 4.8% from the 1980 Census. Our county constitutes 2.99% of Ohio's total population. Four townships had fewer people as compared to their 1980 totals (Canaan, Gilead, North Bloomfield and Westfield), while the other 12 townships gained. Likewise, some villages have shown growth during the last decade, while others have declined.

LIBRARY UPDATE

Funds from the M.C.G.S. treasury were used to buy microfilm to complete the set of "parent county" census records:

DELAWARE: 1820, 1830, 1840 RICHLAND: 1820, 1830, 1840

MARION: 1840

We also donated \$100 to The Ohio Genealogical Society in Mansfield towards the purchase of a microfilm reader/printer. The OGS goal was reached at \$5,909.31 and the order was placed for a machine with zoom lens, positive prints, and plain paper copies (which sounds just like the one the Mount Gilead Public Library has had since 1988).

An addition to the county newspaper collection was made with the acquisition of the Morrow County Independent, a weekly paper published in Cardington. The film purchased cover the years from 1872 to 1954.

Librarians have undertaken the task of extracting vital data from the Morrow County Sentinels; mostly births, deaths and marriages, dating from 4 February 1869. The information will be entered into the library's computer, and will eventually be printed out onto index cards.

NOW IT CAN BE TOLD!

In the November 1985 issue of THE MONUMENT we related a brief history of our namesake, the "Victory Shaft" monument in the center of the intersection of High and Main streets in Mount Gilead. A complete text of the inscriptions on the four faces of the 30-foot granite obelisk was included in the article. That tribute to Morrow County's contribution to the cause during World War I can be read from the safe vantage point of a park bench on the square. But the article was not complete. A bronze plaque (approximately 8" x 18") mounted on the south base obviously contains an inscription, but its text is much smaller than the engraved lettering. Your intrepid editor braved the stares of passing motorists (not to mention dodging traffic moving in all directions) to bring you the text:

> THE AWARD OF THIS SHAFT RECOGNIZES MORROW CO. AS HAVING MAINTAINED THE HIGHEST RECORD OF ALL COUNTIES IN THE UNITED STATES IN PER CAPITA SALES OF WAR SAVINGS STAMPS DURING THE YEARS OF THE WORLD WAR • 1918 AND 1919 •

IN MEMORIAM

Marian Christine (Johnson) Stearns, died 25 May 1991, aged 103 years, 9 months and 10 days, at Pensacola, Florida. We interviewed her for the September 1985 issue of THE MONUMENT, and listed the 17 lineage societies to which she had belonged.

Mrs. Stearns was born in North Amherst, Massachusetts, and served as an army nurse during World War I. She had lived in six states and several Ohio cities during her long lifetime, and was a popular resident of the Woodside Village Center in Mount Gilead, where she lived from April 1985 to October 1990. Marian became a part of our local history when she took a ride in a hot-air balloon on her 100th birthday, and was served the first Bic Mac® when McDonalds's® restaurant opened in Mount Gilead in 1988.

She is survived by two daughters, six grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren.

Florence B. (Dunlap) Main, died 1 July 1991, aged 85 years, 10 months and 5 days, in Mayfield Heights, Ohio. She was a charter member of the Morrow County Genealogical Society, and an early supporter of our efforts to establish an active local organization.

Mrs. Main was also a charter member of The Ohio Genealogical Society, and served as the Library Committee Chairman from 1978 to 1988, driving from her Cleveland home at least once a week to Mansfield to catalogue and process all the book and films acquired. Before her service to OGS she was Genealogical Reference Supervisor at the Western Reserve Historical Society, Cleveland.

Mrs. Main was born in Holgate, Ohio, and married to Carl J. Main on 30 October 1943. He died in 1966. She is survived by a brother, a sister, and several nieces and nephews.
